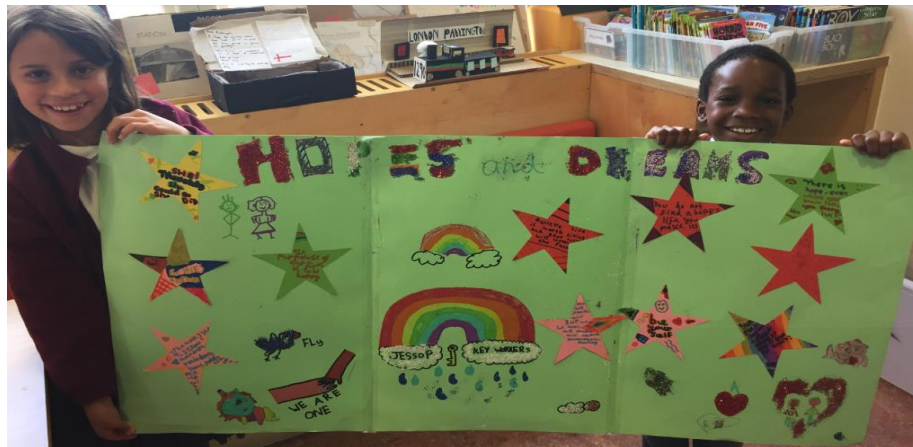
Hopes and Dreams

"I like reading and when I read stories, it makes me happy. It is also fun to see more teachers. I really enjoyed Mr Warner's story." - Year 1

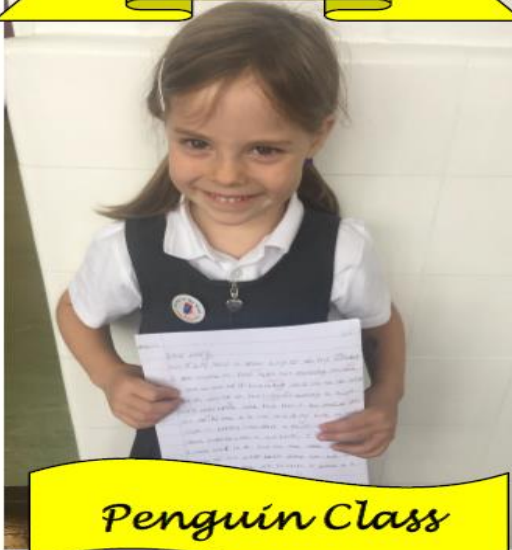

5 – 14. We are SO proud you!

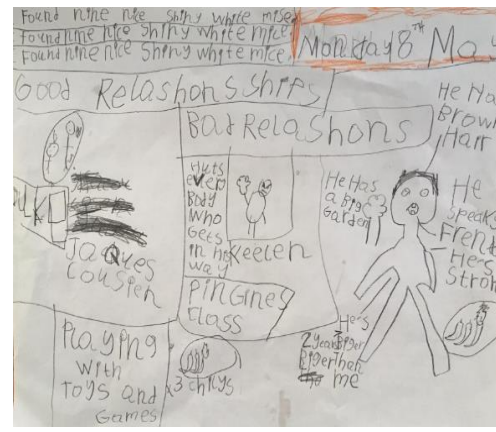
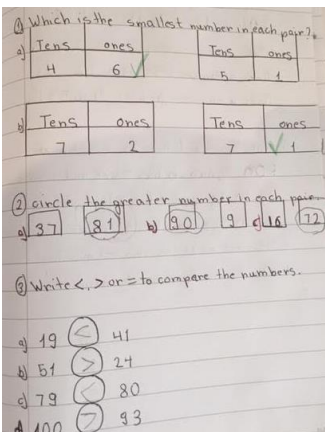
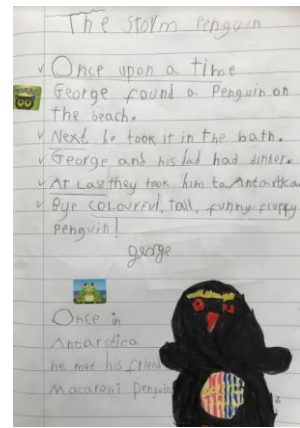
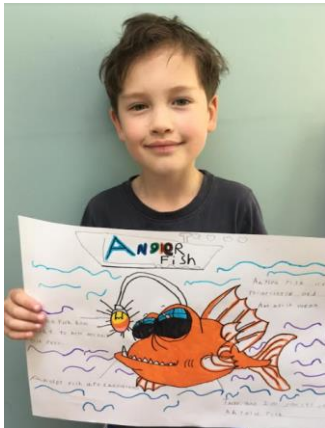
